We now move on to examining the role of police, courts and corrections and their respective roles in the criminal justice system. In second term, we will further examine the allegations of corruption and Royal Commissions into misbehavior in the criminal justice system


High word scores have been recorded, and our two most impressive words were played by Edwin (86) and Ann (88).


This month we read


The Island of Missing Trees by Elik Shafak.


