We remembered how the British forbade the use of the Welsh language - controlling language is a very powerful way of controlling people.

Thank you to those who braved the chilly afternoons to "Playalong" and a big thank you to Bruce who offered to run the classes while I was away.



Book Club


The Voyage of the Narwhal by Andrea Barrett was the first book for this term. A Denver Post reviewer writes, "A luminous work of historical fiction that explores the far reaches of the Arctic and men's souls". That pretty well captures it. The book tells the story of a fateful expedition but manages to weave in some romance and family relationship issues. We learn a lot about early Arctic exploration and the Inuit people. Our group almost universally loved this book. Also throws up ethical issues which are still relevant today.



My Name is Lucy Barton by Elizabeth Strout was second on our list. Not so well received on the whole with some criticising the style of writing. Conversely, others praised the author's skill and even found the book worth a second visit. It takes place over 5 nights in a hospital but reignites memories of poverty, abuse and social exclusion. Mother daughter relationships and love being expressed in many and varied ways is the thread


of the narrative. A book perhaps too easily dismissed by some of us and others managed to see its brilliance.

Middlesex by Jeffrey Eugenides is the story of Calliope who was born intersex, raised as a girl



but who during adolescence becomes Cal, a male. This is a very big book and spans almost a century from war torn Greece and Turkey, to Detroit and finally suburban Grosse Point in Michigan. A mixed response from our group with some loving it, others finding it had too much detail. I think we all appreciated the author's work in covering so much ground and educating us on so much, particularly the intersex issue. This is a family drama of three generations of Greek Americans who carry a family gene leading to a complex outcome. It really is a book worth reading but it does take time.



The official winner of the "not my job" contest...






For the past 21 years my wife has been complaining about me not putting the cap back on the toothpaste.
