Bird Watching:



We have had three new members join us this term keen to go birdwatching. So far, we have had two outings.

Our first was to **Fisherman's Landing** and we increased the number of species seen there to a total of 35. Mind you, last year the birdwatching occurred in June with some species left by then for warmer climates.

Our second outing was to **Stirling Drive Reserve**. This time our count was slightly down on the previous outing which had been held in spring when there are more birds calling. We, still, managed a total of 24 birds detected (seen or heard)

. All our surveys get entered into the Birdlife database, so we are contributing to citizen science on each outing. At the Stirling Drive reserve, we were very lucky to get a really close look at a Rufous Whistler and quite a few glimpses of the elusive Eastern Whipbird. We, also, saw the beautiful little Red Browed Finches and came across quite a few small flocks of the Tasmanian subspecies of Silvereye. This subspecies is characterised by the rich brown flanks which can be seen in the attached photo, courtesy of John Hutchison, a keen photographer with Birdlife East Gippsland.


Our favourite book library is smaller but there are still lots of good books and I will keep refreshing it.

through a laptop, but I am leaving that to Caroline to sort out with the committee.




Hoping other classes had a smoother transition, but certainly no regrets - this sweet little hall was a godsend, and as far as I'm concerned, our only option to remain viable.


BOOK CLUB:



'Nine Days' by Toni Jordan was our first book for the year, and what a great start that was. The opening chapter of the book finds us in Richmond in 1939. The book is written in quite an unusual way which did make it a little challenging to keep track of the characters. However, we felt that it was a really clever and innovative way of managing the timeline. Through the lives of 9 members of the one family, we follow the generations spanning 70 years. The harsh reality of the hard living conditions for those who were just scraping through was very raw and realistic. Many topics were woven through the story... tragic abortion tales, social inequality, ridiculous societal norms, a country at war, post war trauma and the usual family conflicts and tensions. It was surprising how many of us had memories and experiences of Richmond in its early days and/or of more recent times. The character of the suburb is undeniable and a wonderful setting. There are sub themes too which add intrigue and poignancy....a stolen pendant which reappears over

time and a shilling coin, given in secret but holding great meaning for descendants who inherit these items. It really is a very skillfully written work and as a bonus, there are a few really "laugh out loud" moments. A very popular choice.

Staffordshire, England in 1647 is the setting for "In the Margins" by Gail Holmes. Puritanism rules the populace and the main protagonist is charged with enforcing religious compliance and informing on miscreants. She finds this an agonizing situation and puts her at odds, not only with her husband who is the village rector but with powerful members of society. The main character, Frances, is a lover of books and a book collector. This behavior also arouses suspicion in a time when very few women are even literate. Frances and her mother are physically separated but remain connected through a mutual love of Shakespeare. This love of literature puts her in touch with like-minded individuals. The book is apparently inspired by a real person but is essentially a work of fiction, highlighting how ordinary people can do extraordinary things for others. It is beautifully written, very moving and has great character development. It is interesting from a historical point of view also, perhaps not an era we are so familiar with.... fear of witches



and witchcraft is rife. We have not had a meeting to discuss this book so these are mainly my thoughts, but I have heard incidental feedback and it seems that others are loving this debut novel.

This is the last Book Club report from me as we are relocating. After 50+ years in East Gippsland it is of course sad to be leaving such a wonderful environment and especially friends from various groups and locations. Lakes Entrance U3A has been a large part of that, and I wish the committee and members all the best and thanks for the memories and friendship.
